

One common expression describing prayer states, "Prayer Changes Things." This is an encouraging word for us who believe our prayers are heard and make a difference. When we pray, we are hoping for one of two responses: for someone or something to be successful, and for someone or something to change. Our scriptures point to a variety of times when people prayed and something happened in their life. One of the greatest hopes we can have in prayer is to capture the attention and heart of God. Prayer can reveal our true motivation and the heart behind our hopes. I am hoping to encourage us all to be reflective in the coming weeks as we take time to pray.

My first encouragement is that prayer can and will become the deepest and most sincere work of our human spirit. When we enter into a time of prayer, alone and uninhibited by any distractions, an honesty will emerge that exposes us and prepares us to be enlightened by God's voice and vision in us. There is no greater starting place in our life for success and needed change than honesty in the presence of our creator. In the tenth chapter of Acts, Peter, one of Jesus' earliest disciples, was praying one afternoon when he saw a vison of birds and reptiles and four-footed creatures being lowered from the sky. This was accompanied by a voice telling him to take, kill, and eat. His initial response was, "By no means, Lord." But the voice continued, "What God has made clean, you must never call profane." His prayer time continued and eventually led him to visit and befriend a Roman military officer named Cornelius, and consequently to a friendship that embraced a new hospitality he never knew was possible or appropriate. He made friends with someone he previously believed to be "off limits" and "unclean." Prayer leads us to new understanding and times of needed change in our life.

Another encouragement in prayer is that it can also be experienced with others. When we pray in community, a worship service, or some other meeting, we are actually praying God's spirit into our presence, and consequently our presence into God's spirit. This can be a bonding moment for a group of people, and a time of revealing our purpose in the lives of one another, as well as our purpose to the larger world. When we pray alone or in a group, it can lead to a clarity that will become a guide and motivation for our lives. I asked a friend once what he thinks of prayer, and he responded, "reaching out to someone who is more than I am."

Finally, I want to acknowledge that our world is filled with very complex circumstances, both good and bad, but nevertheless overwhelming. And, what is needed to sustain a quality of life and opportunity seems far away at times. In short, is there a hope for a peace-filled and harmonious future for our planet and coming generations? The response to this is first prayer. Second, listening through our honesty before God, and finally a courage to follow the convictions of our heart. Every person has a vital role in the well-being of another, and finding and fulfilling this vital role begins in our time spent in prayer together with our Lord.

Included with this newsletter is a reviewed and signed copy of the **2018** Church Balance Sheet. This document was unavailable at the time of the annual meeting. Annual meeting voted that Executive Council would review and accept this document when it was ready. The document would then be sent out in a church newsletter for all to see. Executive Council did review and accept this report at it's April 2019 meeting.

**A&F Update**: A&F has signed contracts for replacing the back door and replacing the front column. Both theses projects have long lead times as both the door and column are special order items. The back door will be slightly narrower and will be a black panel door similar to the front doors of the church. We will use the same lock on the new door, so if you have a church key it will still work. A&F had to go to the Historical Commission to get permission to make this change. The front column (26 feet tall, largest readily available is 24 feet) will be made out of state and shipped here to Framingham. The column work is not expected to be finished until September at the earliest. A&F is also in the process of receiving quotes for refinishing the floor in Reilly Hall. We hope to make a decision at our June meeting and have the floors done in either July or August when there is much less activity in the building.
